## Prevent Frozen Pipes

- Likely places for frozen water pipes are against exterior walls and where water service enters the home through the foundation. Keep these areas warm.
- When away from home during cold weather, leave the heat on and set no lower than 55°F, or request to have water shut off at meter box.
- When it snows, keep snow piled up over your water meter box to insulate against wind and cold.
- Winterize sprinklers and ensure the waste valve is shut off completely. If left open even a little, water may constantly run or drip causing a high water bill and risk sprinkler pipes to freeze and break.

## Make a New Year's resolution to prepare for emergencies

The most effective method for surviving a disaster is to be prepared: • Know ahead of time what types of disasters are likely for your area. • Decide how you'll stay in touch with loved ones. Set up a meeting place right outside of the home as well as another location outside your neighborhood in case of evacuation. • Establish an out-of-town point of contact who knows your emergency plan; make sure children know how to contact this person. • Learn about existing preparedness plans in your area and make sure your plan correlates. • Practice your plan often.

## CERT training teaches disaster response skills

Learn basic emergency preparedness and disaster response skills at a CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) training course. Training includes personal and family preparedness, light search and rescue, basic fire suppression and utilities control, disaster medical triage and patient treatment, disaster psychology, terrorism awareness, and CERT team organization and management.

Course begins February 11 and will continue on consecutive Thursdays through March 24. Held at Ogden Weber Tech College 6:30 - 9 p.m., class is \$30 which pays for safety gear and training materials. ## Ogden City Animal Services reminds pet owners to keep four-legged friends warm this winter

- Limit outdoor time and provide adequate shelter so pets can get out of the wind, snow, and rain. Wind chill makes days feel colder for your pet than the thermometer reads.
- Ensure pets have fresh, unfrozen water available at all times. Avoid stainless steel or metal bowls, try buckets or heated bowls.
- Protect paws from salt and other ice-melt chemicals as they irritate the pads of your pet's feet. Wipe paws with a damp towel before your pet licks them and irritates his or her mouth.
- Like coolant, antifreeze is a lethal poison for dogs and cats. Be sure to thoroughly clean up any spills and consider using products that contain propylene glycol rather than ethylene glycol.
- Remember, if it's too cold for you, it's



probably too cold for your pet. Keep animals inside. If left outdoors, pets can freeze, become disoriented, lost, stolen, injured or killed.

- Don't leave pets alone in a car. Cars can act like a refrigerator holding in the cold and causing animals to freeze to death.
- Provide a warm place for pets to sleep off of the floor and away from drafts. A cozy dog or cat bed with a warm blanket or pillow is perfect.
